Study Questions

Use these questions in your community group time to dig deeper and discover how you can apply today's message to everyday life.

INTRODUCTION

We're all busy. Our schedules are packed with career, family, friends, church, and other responsibilities. Sometimes our days are so full that we don't enjoy anything because we're trying to do everything. Our relationship with God and with others benefits when we create breathing room in our schedules. But where do we start?

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. What would you say are your main priorities? What things do you value theoretically? Compare this to your calendar. What does your schedule reveal about what you value practically?
2. What keeps us bound to our schedules? Why do we fear taking space to be still and listen? How does God respond to those fears?
3. Think about how you managed your time last year. What would you like to do differently this year?
4. Read together Psalm 90:10–12. Do you tend to think of your days as endless? Why is it difficult for us to number our days?
5. Do you currently or have you ever, kept a Sabbath day? If so, what were the benefits? If not, what is challenging about the idea of taking a day off from your responsibilities and obligations?
6. What is one thing you need to add to your schedule? What is one thing you need to subtract? What is your one essential? If you could only fit one thing into your daily routine, what would it be?
7. What is one thing you can do this week to begin to create breathing room in your schedule? What can this group do to support you?

MOVING FORWARD

Whether it's work, family, or other obligations, something is going to control your time. Why not give control to the One who gave it to you? Creating breathing room in your schedule begins when you recognize that time is limited . . . and therefore valuable. Use your time wisely.
